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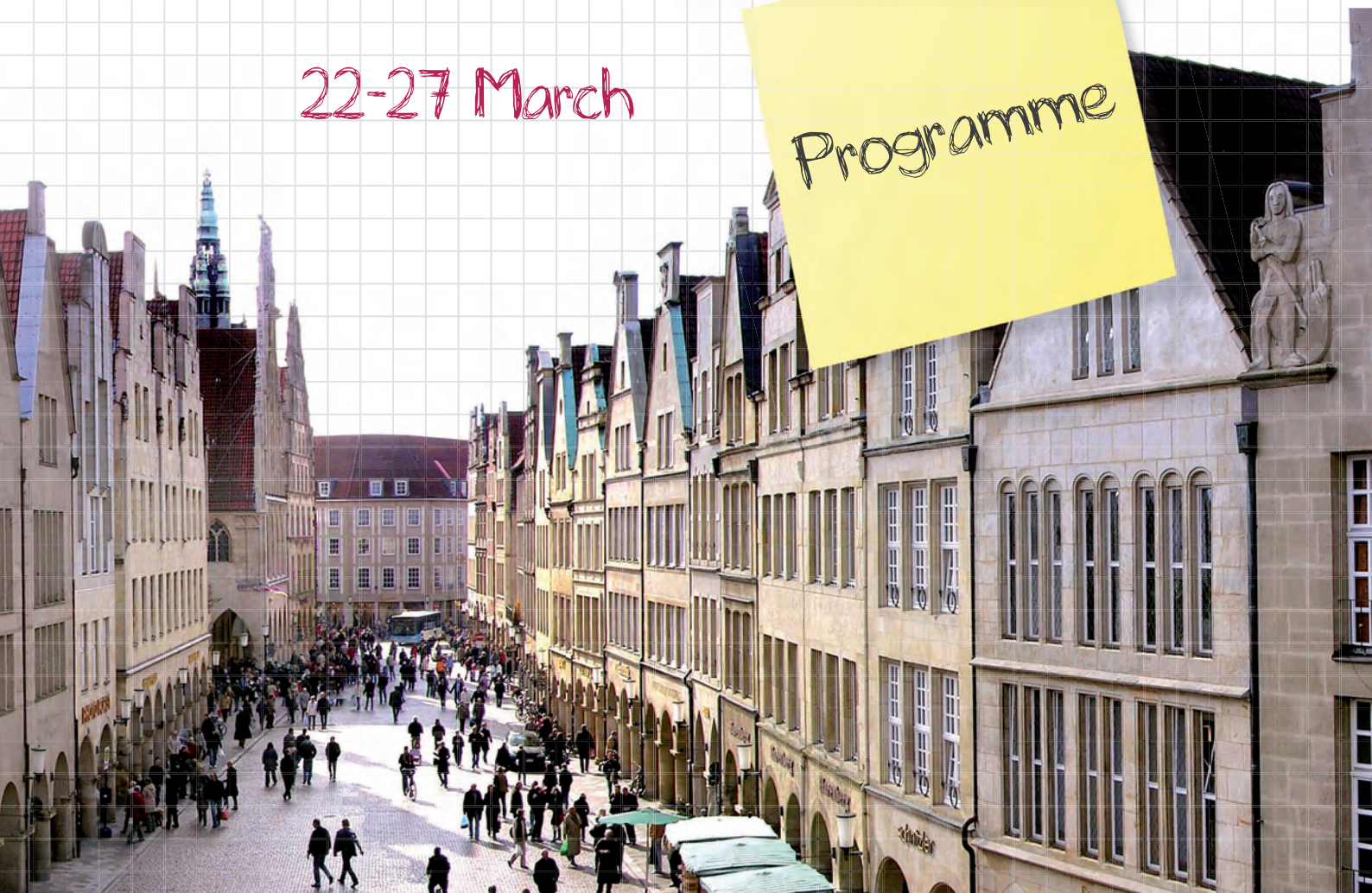

- An extra ‘Ruby Red’ Special Issue of European Political Science (EPS) on ‘Forty Years of European Political Science’ that looks back and reflects on the development of the discipline in terms of the profession, research and teaching.
- Specially designed silk ties and scarves, which can be purchased from ECPR Central Services, as well as 40th lapel badges which are free!
- A Round Table during the UK PSA’s Annual Conference (Edinburgh, March-April) on ‘European Political Science: Past, Present and Future’.



Roundtable: “Forty Years of European Political Science: what have we learnt?”

To celebrate the ECPR’s 40th year, the ECPR invites all Joint Sessions attendees to a special Roundtable dedicated to discussing the progress of our discipline in the period since the ECPR’s birth. Has political science become more mature and sophisticated in its methods and techniques? Can it now explain things which forty years ago it would have struggled to do so? Has the discipline become more united around a common core of values, beliefs and methods? Or has it become largely fragmented and dissipated into a stream of sub-disciplinary belief systems which won’t and can’t talk to each other? Has there developed a distinctively European political science that can be contrasted with its North American counterpart? If so, is that distinctiveness a strength or a weakness? What is the current state of our discipline and what are its prospects? What are its strengths and its weaknesses and what does the discipline need to do in order to survive and thrive as a social science in the coming period?

Several leading scholars will discuss these and other issues in a Roundtable which we hope will generate a good deal of discussion and questions.

Jean Blondel is Professorial Fellow at the European University Institute, Florence, and Visiting Professor at the University of Siena and the University of Essex, where he was Founder of the Department of Government in 1964 and a member of staff until 1983. He co-founded the European Consortium for Political Research in 1970 and directed it up to 1978.

Hans Daalder was Professor of Political Science at Leiden University (1963-1993) and a Founding Member of the ECPR’s Executive Committee (1970-1988). He was organizer of the first two ‘individual’ workshops before the establishment of Joint Sessions (1973) as well as Chairman of the Workshop Committee (1974-1976), Chair of the ECPR and the first Head of Department of Political and Social Sciences of European University Institute (1976-1979).

Drude Dahlerup is Professor at the department of Political Science at Stockholm University (since 1998). She was one of the founders of Women’s Studies (now Politics & Gender). She attended the first ECPR workshop on women in politics (Berlin 1978), and has since then organized several ECPR workshops and panels, some of which have resulted in collaborative research output.

Hans-Dieter Klingemann is Professor of Political Science at the Wissenschaftszentrum Berlin and Freie Universität Berlin, and, in 2008-09, received the John G. Diefenbaker Award to work at Simon Fraser University, Canada (2008-09). He was a member of the Executive Committee of the ECPR (1988-1994), as well as President of the European Political Science Network (2002-2005) (now the EPSnet Network in the ECPR).

Ken Newton is Emeritus Professor of Comparative Politics at the University of Southampton, and former Professor at the University of Essex. He was a member of the ECPR Executive Committee (1981-1991) and Executive Director of the ECPR (1991-2001).

Institute of Political Science at the University of Münster

The Institute of Political Science is pleasantly situated on the bank of the Aasee, a recreational area of the medieval town of Münster that once was at the centre of attention of European politics, when the Peace Treaty of Westphalia was signed. The Institute of Political Science and its neighbouring Institute of Sociology are both departments of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Pedagogies. With more than 14,000 students enrolled, this faculty is among the largest of the University of Münster.

The University was founded in 1780 by a Westphalian nobleman who served as the equivalent of a modern-day secretary of state for the Archbishop of Cologne and Münster. At that time, this Archbishop was both Head of State and principal of the Catholic Church in the region, a powerful man who resided in Münster Castle that today houses the administration of Münster University. This short glimpse of history already indicates that Münster University is closely interwoven with the ups and down of politics in the city. When the Prussians took over the political power in the region of Westphalia after the Napoleonic Wars, Münster University was downgraded to an institution for the training of teachers. It took almost 100 years until the statutes of a university were given back to Münster. This time it was the German Emperor Wilhelm II who re-instated Münster as a university town and who lends his name to the university. Against the background of the Emperor's dubious role in German history, the choice of name – Westfälische Wilhelms-Universität – remains a bone of contention. Also in Münster, the Third Reich was a dark period for the university. Although the city was a stronghold of Catholicism with the famous Bishop Graf von Galen protesting

against the ideology and the ideas of National Socialism, party members and paladins of the Hitler movement heavily infiltrated the university and particularly the Faculty of Medicine. A commission inaugurated by the rector of the university and headed by prominent historians is now shedding light on this dark chapter in the history of Münster University. The Second World War was disastrous for both the city and the university. By the end of the war more than 90 percent of the buildings in the inner city had been completely destroyed and Münster University was also in ruins. It took several decades to re-build the city and restore the university. It was a tough time because much had to be re-established and re-generated after years of academic control under the dictatorship of National Socialism.

Münster University traditionally has been the training ground for the classical professions, law, medicine and theology. In accordance with the law of succession in Westphalia, the farm and country house would be inherited by the eldest son, while the second and third sons were supposed to follow careers either in the clergy or in public administration. Still today, Münster University hosts a famous school of law and a prestigious medical school. Its Faculty of Theology is well known in Germany and worldwide. One of the most prestigious former members of Münster's Faculty of Theology is Pope Benedict XVI, who in the 1960s served as professor of Catholic theology at the Wilhelms-University.

In the shadow of those traditional faculties, one might assume that it was difficult for the social sci-

ences to become established in Münster, but in fact the converse was true. Münster is one of the very few German universities that founded an Institute of Sociology as early as the 1950s. Headed by Prof. Helmut Schelsky, the Institute of Sociology at Münster University soon developed into one of the leading academic centres for empirical sociological research in the country. However, it took another decade before the Institute of Political Science was established with the aim of rounding up the spectrum of social sciences at Münster University. Again, one might expect that the relatively late foundation of the institute was probably associated with the turbulent time of the late 1960s, the student movement and perhaps even with the first concert in Germany of the legendary rock-band, the Rolling Stones that took place in 1968 in Münster.

But the reason why the Wilhelms-University took the initiative to introduce political science as a further subject of study and research is much simpler: At the end of the 1960s the government of North Rhine-Westphalia made "political science" an obligatory school subject. After the war apart from the faculties of law, medicine and theology, Münster University had also developed into one of the major centres in the country for teacher training, and specifically for secondary school education. With political science as a prime school subject, universities were now

obliged to offer relevant courses in regard to teacher training. In 1970, the Institute of Political Science at Münster University officially started its teaching program. At that time, just one professor and two research associates constituted the core of the Institute. In its first semester, about 100 students, most of whom were prospective teachers, took part in the five seminars offered by the institute. For many years, Prof. Gerhard Wittkämper, appointed as a full professor to Münster University in the early 1970s, was the spiritus rector of the Institute of Political Science. He served as its director up until his retirement in the late 1990s and even today still enjoys both lecturing and being a highly acknowledged member of the faculty.

Today, forty years after its foundation, the Institute of Political Science at Münster University looks back upon a remarkable success story. In the winter term 2008/09, more than 1700 students were enrolled in nine study programs. The faculty consisted of fourteen members, amongst those three full, six associated and three assistant professors, two lecturers and three research and teaching assistants. The institute is organized around three specific areas – "Governance/Europeanization and Globalization", "Civil Society and Democracy" and "Processes of Transformation and Regionalization" – that provide the organizational infrastructure for the co-operation of the faculty and the further development of the curricula. With respect to the Bologna process, the Institute of Political Science took the initiative launching two innovative B.A. programs in the early 2000s. In co-operation with the Faculty of Law and the Faculty of Economics and



Business Administration, the institute offers the B.A. programs “Politics and Law” and “Politics and Economics”. Since the beginning of the co-operation with the faculties of law and economics, Prof. Klaus Schubert serves as the program coordinator of the two B.A. curricula. Indeed aficionados of the joint B.A. programs are also Prof. Rüdiger Robert and Prof. Norbert Konegen. Though both recently retired, they still continue to offer courses and supervise students, particularly those enrolled in these two programs. Apart from these two specific B.A. courses, the institute is also involved in the overall B.A. curricula at Münster University that provides students with a wide spectrum of options to combine different disciplines, such as Political Science and Geography or Political Science and History.

The institute has also been a pioneer in the development of the Master program “Political Science” that was introduced in 2006. Currently, there are about forty students enrolled in this degree course. Internationalization has always been a key-concern of the Institute of Political Science at Münster University and members of the faculty are particularly proud of the institute’s international degree programs. Since the late 1970s, the institute co-operates with the Institute d’Etudes Politiques de Lille. What once started as a so-called double-diploma program has recently been transformed into consecutive Bachelor and Master programs which every year each offer 40 students from Germany and France the opportunity to experience the development of a purely European teaching and research community. Two experts in international relations and particularly in European Studies – Prof. Reinhard Meyers and Prof. Wichard Woyke – started the co-operation with the IEP. Currently, Prof. Doris Fuchs serves as the faculty member in charge of supervising the French-German cooperation. Furthermore the institute also maintains close cooperation with the University of Twente, which is situated just across the border in neighbouring Enschede. The joint Bachelor degree course “Public Administration” and the Master program “Europe

across borders” are currently being evaluated and restructured in order to meet the requirements of the Bologna process. As is evident in the institute’s international co-operation, its prime goal is to offer students high-profile curricula with a specific European flavour. But the outlook of the institute does not stop short at the borders of the European Union. There has also been a pioneering tradition with respect to teaching programs and research projects focusing on the Far East. The tradition of monitoring what is going on at the other side of the globe, e.g. in Japan, in the so-called Tiger States or in Vietnam and Laos, was started by Prof. Paul Kevenhörster. Currently, Prof. Susanne Feske, an expert in International Relations and Far East Studies who was appointed to the institute in the late 1990s is highly successful in getting students, in particular doctoral students, interested in these parts of the world.

The institute also has a fine reputation in providing doctoral students with excellent opportunities for studying and research. The Graduate School of Politics (Grasp) doubtlessly constitutes one of the hallmarks of the Institute of Political Science in Münster. At the moment, there are 51 students working on their doctoral dissertations enrolled in the Grasp. The Grasp is closely affiliated with the Postgraduate Program “Negotiating Processes of Civil Society from the 19th century to the present – Germany and the Netherlands compared”, funded by the German Research Foundation. The program, which is hosted by the House of the Netherlands and chaired by Prof. Friso Wielenga started in 2006. Providing research opportunities and funding for ten doctoral students and one post-doc at least for the period of six years, the program is based on an interdisciplinary approach and an interesting mix of disciplines, amongst those history, political science, ethnology, and philology of the Netherlands.

Moreover, the institute at Münster University is one of the few institutes of Political Science in Germany currently hosting two positions or chairs in gender

studies. Prof. Brigitte Young who has been with the institute since the late 1990s, introduced the new and expanding field of Comparative International Political Economics to the institute. Prof. Brigitte Wilde who has just joined the institute is focusing her research on the nexus between the topics of gender and European integration. It has to be mentioned that faculty members of the institute have always been highly gender sensitive. In the early 2000s, the institute was the main co-coordinator of the EU funded research and training network “Women at European Universities” which was supervised by Prof. Annette Zimmer. Since 2005, the faculty member PD. Christiane Frantz serves as the Equal Opportunities Commissioner of the University, a time-consuming but most important university position. With five female professors, the institute ranks at the top among the institutes of political science in Germany with respect to women in positions of authority.

A further highlight of the institute’s teaching and research program is related to its co-operation with the Cluster of Excellence “Religion and Politics in Pre-Modern and Modern Cultures” which is generously funded by the German Research Foundation. More than 150 researchers at Münster University are involved in this remarkable research initiative and co-operation. The establishment of a “Cluster of Excellence” at a German university, signals the successful outcome of a difficult and highly time-consuming process of application. The German Research Foundation awards “Clusters of Excellence” only to those research projects that are definitely at the frontier of science. Due to the Cluster five new academic chairs were created, one of which, the chair for “Politics and Religion”, is based at the Institute of Political Science and is occupied by Prof. Ulrich Willems, who was appointed to the Institute of Political Science in 2008. Due to the involvement of the institute in this highly prestigious research initiative, three research projects were made possible and are based at the institute.

WWU Münster: Knowledge and Life

Research: Excellent prospects

Münster offers a unique symbiosis between dedicated research work and a high quality of life. And this makes Münster attractive. With its wide range of research areas and excellent working conditions, as well as its intensive support for junior academics, the Westfälische Wilhelms-Universität Münster (WWU) has a strong appeal to researchers, academics and cooperation partners. A total of nine Collaborative Research Centers are being funded at WWU by the German Research Foundation. One of these is the ground-breaking nanoscience project “Multilevel Molecular Assemblies – Structure, Dynamics and Functions”. In the world’s first intercontinental trans-regional Collaborative Research Center, researchers in physics, chemistry, biology and economics in Beijing and Münster are joining together to form an interdisciplinary research network which is unique in its field.

Research in Münster is characterized by continuous exchange across all borders. There are countless opportunities for researchers to look at an object of research together – and, from the sum of all the different views, to see it from a unique new angle. The “Religion and Politics” Cluster of Excellence shows how this interdisciplinary approach to research at WWU works in practice. It is one of the biggest clusters in the field of the humanities in Germany which aims to solve current conflicts, in particular those motivated by religion. In order to make it easier for junior academics to join projects of this kind, the WWU offers a total of ten Research Training Groups where outstanding students are individually and systematically guided towards a PhD. This is bearing

fruit. With around 800 PhDs awarded annually, WWU is one of the five most important institutions in Germany for the development of junior academics.

Studying: First-rate all round

Over 37,000 students make WWU the fifth-largest university in Germany. The teaching offered by a total of 15 faculties comprises 250 courses of study in 110 subjects covering practically all areas of the humanities, social sciences, medicine and natural sciences. In addition to the diversity of courses on offer, their interlinked structure and the training of skills considered today to be key qualifications are characteristic of the all-embracing understanding of education at WWU. These include flexibility, social competence, a sense of responsibility and being able to see things in a holistic context.

The study courses held at WWU entirely in English have an equally international orientation. Many other international and interdisciplinary courses promote cross-border exchanges at an academic level. The first interdisciplinary Master’s course in “Dutch-German Studies”, offered jointly with the University of Nijmegen in the Netherlands, which combines teaching by the departments of economics and law, history and politics, intercultural studies and business communication.

Knowledge and Life

When academics and students are asked what makes learning, living and working in Münster so attractive, the answer is usually simple: Münster itself. There are many good reasons for this: for example, the city’s often cited bicycle-friendliness,

the large number of cafés and pubs, the theaters, cinemas and museums, the many green spaces and the attractive Old City. And there is a reason why all these amenities can be used and enjoyed by everyone in everyday life: WWU. WWU and Münster are not conceivable without each other. The University’s motto of “Knowledge and Life” transfers into something that can be realized every day: in Münster, knowledge is lived out and, at the same time, Münster has *savoir vivre*. Numerous places in Münster bring academic life and the outside world together. This includes the Botanical Garden – an institute belonging to the University and providing a basis for research and teaching, but at the same time an oasis of peace and recreation which is open to all residents and guests in Münster. Another example are WWU’s museums, which enjoy an outstanding reputation far beyond the borders of the University.

Blondel und Wildenmann Prize



Jean Blondel PhD Prize Winner 2009: Daniel Mügge

The Jean Blondel PhD Prize in 2009 has been awarded to Daniel Mügge for his dissertation „*Widen the Market, Narrow the Competition: The Emergence of Supranational Governance in EU Capital Markets*“.

The jury of the prize (Alfio Mastropaolo, Susan Scarrow and Vincent Hoffmann-Martinot) considered this dissertation to be extremely well written, fascinating and timely. It is an excellent dissertation in international political economy, addressing a key issue concerning the supranationalization of governance: how can we best understand changes in patterns of governance in relation to shifting market structures? The prize will be awarded during the Joint Sessions of Workshops in Münster in March 2010.

Since August 2008, Daniel Mügge has been Assistant Professor in International Relations and International Political Economy at the University of Amsterdam. In 2002, he was awarded an MA in International

Relations (with honours) at the International School for Humanities and Social Sciences (ISHSS), University of Amsterdam.

In September 2008, he defended his dissertation *Widen the Market, Narrow the Competition: The Emergence of Supranational Governance in EU Capital Markets* with a committee composed of Prof. G.R.D. Underhill (advisor), Dr. B.M. Burgoon, Prof. G.C.A. Junne, Prof. S.P. Lütz, and Prof. J.H.F. Story.

About The Thesis

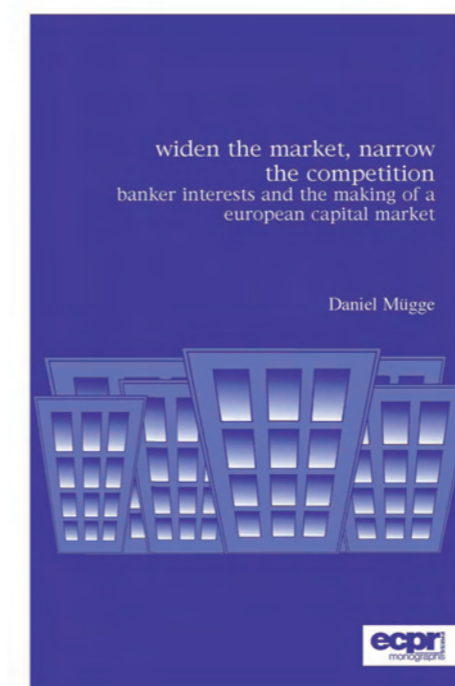
Over the past 20 years, EU capital markets have changed radically. Back in the 1980s every country had its own, national financial industry. Two decades later, there is one European ‘Champions League’ of firms in both investment banking and among stock exchanges. On top, EU member states have transferred regulatory powers to Brussels. By now, one single set of rules governs capital markets throughout the continent—something national governments stubbornly resisted only a decade earlier.

What explains this Europeanization of capital market governance? *Widen the Market, Narrow the Competition* argues that the financial industry itself has played a crucial role in pushing policy from national capitals ‘up’ to Brussels. Less than two decades ago most banks in Europe saw a single market as a threat rather than an opportunity, fearing competition from the City and US investment banks in particular. Heeding their preferences, governments hardly ceded control over policy making. But in the 1990s the mood changed. Banks such as ABN Amro and

Deutsche Bank all rushed into international investment banking. In the wake of this strategy shift they emerged as the most vocal and powerful lobby for the regime that is in place today, marked by crossborder integration, harmonized regulation and considerable influence for technocratic, supranational EU committees.

Widen the Market, Narrow the Competition tells and analyzes this story based on policy documents and more than 50 in-depth interviews. It not only shows how EU capital market integration and the policy that made it possible are two sides of the same coin. In light of the crisis that has gripped also European financial markets since June 2007, it sheds a critical light on a policy process in which banks and stock exchanges themselves have become ever more important players, while national parliaments—and thus ordinary citizens—have been pushed to the sidelines.

Political Science between Vision and Reality –
Lessons in Times of Crises

*(Stein Rokkan Lecture at the occasion of the ECPR
Joint Sessions of Workshops, University of Münster,
March 2010)*

Abstract

Political science with its rich history, but varying national traditions and contexts, deals with a multi-dimensional and ever-changing subject matter which we are inevitably part of. This poses specific epistemological problems, but also offers the opportunity to contribute to the shaping of political reality by insights and actions. This lecture gives a brief outline of this problematique and then, by way of illustration, presents the findings of a major international research project on the political effects of the Great Depression in Europe in the interwar period. Based on this experience, some (tentative and personal) lessons will be drawn for the state of political science and its potential contributions facing the present world economic crisis.

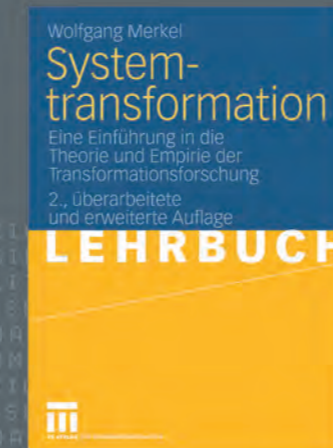
Short biography

Dirk Berg-Schlosser, born 1943, is professor (em.) at Philipps University Marburg/Germany. Previous appointments and visiting professorships included teaching at the universities of Munich, Aachen, Augsburg, Eichstätt, Nairobi, Stellenbosch./South Africa, Berkeley, Prague, Lille, Vienna and Sciences-Po Paris. He was also an instructor at the ECPR Summer Schools on concepts and methods at Essex, Ljubljana and Sao Paulo. He holds doctorates from the Universities of Munich, Augsburg and UC Berkeley.

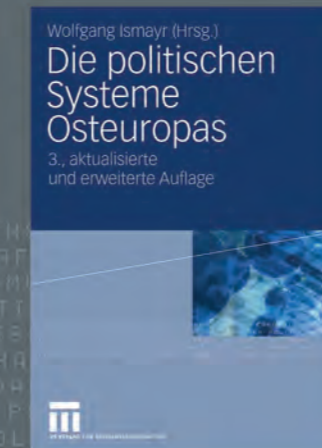
His research interests include political culture, empirical democratic theory, development studies and comparative methodology. From 2003 to 2006 he was Chair of the European Consortium for Political Research (ECPR), from 2006 to 2009 Vice-President of the International Political Science Association (IPSA). He currently is Summer School Coordinator for IPSA.

His major publications include Tradition and Change in Kenya, Political Stability and Development, Political Culture in Germany, Empirische Demokratieforschung, Poverty and Democracy, Conditions of Democracy in Europe 1919-1939, Perspectives of Democratic Consolidation in Eastern Europe, Democratization – The State of the Art, and a number of textbooks. He is currently co-editor of the International Encyclopaedia of Political Science (8 vol., forthc.).

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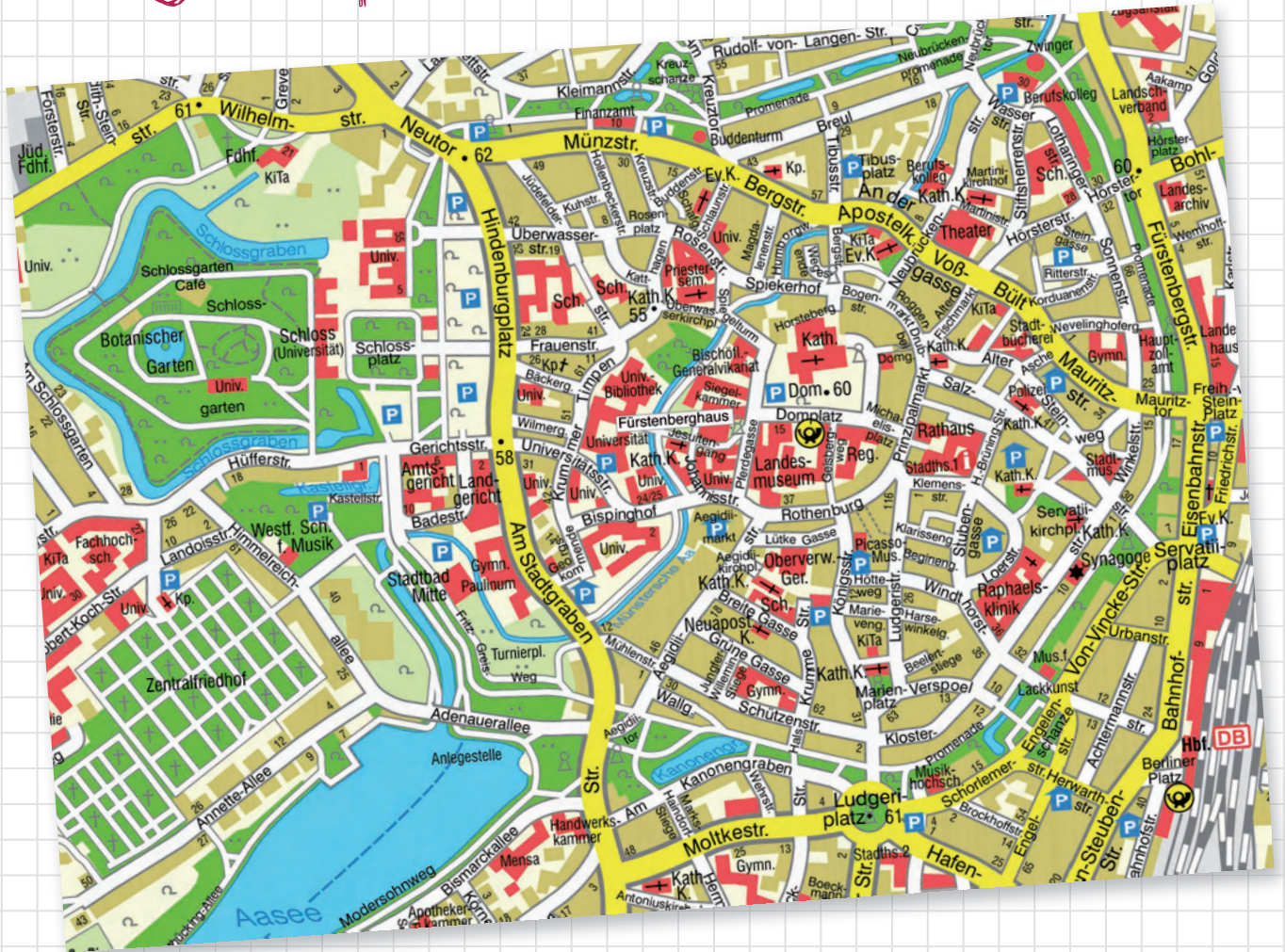
